## **Rationale and context**

**ENSERES** 

The ENSERES project **"ENhancing Socio-Ecological RESilience in Mediterranean coastal areas**" seeks transformative changes by bending the environmental degradation curve with an integrated solution approach at the transboundary level, both inside and outside areas under legal protection i.e. protected areas, and involving public authorities, socio-economic actors and civil society organisations. It focuses on transferring and mainstreaming ecosystem-based management (EBM) basics to implement Integrated Coastal Zone Management (ICZM) processes in multi-level conservation and territorial practices leading to better-prepared communities and natural assets.

ENSERES is an initiative funded by the European Union, in the frame of the ENI CBC MED Cooperation Programme. It aims at transferring solutions across the Mediterranean shores to respond to the growing needs of coastal cities and protected area stakeholders to manage these areas in a sustainable way. These solutions are multifaceted and of various kinds including purposeful knowledge newly generated, monitoring and management support tools, and digital tailor-made platforms of relevance to target stakeholders. All these solutions are gathered in a user-friendly <u>catalogue</u> to make them easy to access and apply by different users.

The implementation of these solutions at different geographical scales, from the Mediterranean regional to the local level, requires the engagement of different types of actors and networks, from international environmental organizations to local authorities, working together to develop new policies, measures, and practices involving bluer and greener jobs at various levels. Knowledge of ecosystems and the environmental threats and pressures faced by Mediterranean coastal communities can provide the basis for the adoption of management measures within and outside protected areas using an ecosystem-based approach, as in the case of cities and protected areas collaborating in Sfax (Tunisia) and in Tyre (Lebanon), the pilot sites of the ENSERES project.

The insights and lessons learnt gained from the knowledge transfer activities, subgrants provided to local organizations, and networking with similar projects and institutions will be widely shared at the Mediterranean level during this event, which follows on from national events held in both countries. This final event plays a crucial role in promoting the findings and results beyond the project area and opens up opportunities for future progress.

### **Objectives**

The objective of the final event is to showcase the results of the ENSERES project and examine their relevance to the challenges faced in the Mediterranean region with regard to the conservation and sustainable management of coastal biodiversity as well as increasing the resilience of coastal communities and their livelihoods within and around protected areas.

The expected outcomes include:

- Highlighting the successes achieved through **collaborative efforts** among **protected area and city stakeholders** for enhancing socio-ecological resilience levels along the Mediterranean coastal region.
- Transferring effective solutions that meet the needs of both people and nature in coastal cities and protected areas, and **showcasing co-designed approaches** that foster everyone's involvement in their management.
- Improving the capacities of local stakeholders through effective cooperative exchanges on joint solutions to boost Tunisia and Lebanon's ecosystems, and environmental and cultural values, combat marine pollution and conserve our shared natural resources.

This event aims at engaging stakeholders interested or involved in coastal and marine management, and presenting findings that can guide more effective conservation efforts, with a focus on the role of the Integrated Coastal Zone Management Protocol (ICZM) and the Protected Areas network in the Mediterranean. This event aims to engage the following stakeholders: regional, national and local authorities and technical teams, Civil Society Organisations (CSOs), researchers, the fishing community, tourism stakeholders, and EU programmes representatives.

Participants will have the opportunity to discuss first-hand with the key partners, collaborators and civil society organizations who have tested some of the tools included in the ENSERES toolkit, and learn from the actions deployed by the subgrantees' community to increase awareness regarding Mediterranean biodiversity, ecosystems, and the value and services they provide, among young people, public officials, conservation officers, and the general public. The added benefit of working together with a shared vision and goals in safeguarding biodiversity and promoting sustainable local livelihoods will be part of the agenda.

The event is organized by the ENSERES partnership. This partnership is led by ETC-UMA and includes : SPA/RAC, MedCities, MedPAN, the Tyre Coast Nature Reserve (Lebanon), the Municipality of Sfax (Tunisia), and the MEDSEA Foundation.
